Guidelines

- A cartoon is created in stages. In this book, we present each stage, one after the other, in a very clear format. In order for you to reach the final stage, you must follow each step, exactly as shown in the book.
- The strokes that shape each object are drawn in three colors: Red, black, and gray. Each color has its own job; pay attention!
- The gray strokes are there to help you; they're only guides and are not meant to stay there. For example, in order to draw an oval, we'll work with a circle. The circle will be drawn in gray, and around it, you'll draw the oval. Erase all the gray strokes when the picture is done.
- The black strokes are the final lines, which make up the final illustration.
- The red strokes indicate the step that you are up to at that point. For example, if there's a drawing of a face, in the middle you'll have a circle drawn in gray. Around it will be a black oval, which is the final shape of the face. The ears are red – because that's the step you're up to. You need to draw the ears now!
- Continue, keep going with your illustration step by step, until you end up with a fantastic cartoon.
- You can also learn about coloring cartoons by looking carefully at the colors used for the cartoons in this book.
